Adjusted trajectories

Inspired by historical accounts of people who were excluded, rejected or silenced. I wanted to give voice to those whose circumstances (cultural, political, social etc.) made them voiceless.

Using found images, analogue double exposures, I wanted to bring these images to life. By exposing our garden plants around them, I sought to depict what it would be like to invite these people into our garden for a day, where their stories could be heard.

The layered collaged waves as well as the intentional light leaks represent the possible directions their lives could have taken in different circumstances.







Mimicry

Mimicry, the ability of an organism to imitate its surroundings, has been crucial to the survival and success of species and artistic movements alike.

Mimicry has allowed animals to adapt and blend in with their environment, increasing their chances of survival. As artists, we too have drawn inspiration from the world around us, often mimicking, incorporating styles and techniques of those who have gone before us. But in doing so, we inevitably inject our own perspective and lived experiences into our work.

Through my project, I explore the balance between mimicry and originality, in the context of photography and collage, questioning what it means to be truly unique. These mediums enable the creation of works that challenge traditional notions of originality. Our tendency to take over our contemporaries's mannerisms and styles to strengthen our connections can be both sustaining and stifling as we try to balance the desire for distinctiveness with the desire for belonging.


By multiplying, layering, re-contextualising, and re-photographing found and old family photos, I seek to prompt viewers to question their own relationship with originality.

Biography, CV

Agnes Eperjesy is a visual artist working in collage, mixed media and photography.

She grew up in Gyor, Hungary where she studied fine art as well as economics before moving to the UK and recently Italy and Sweden. She completed a photojournalism diploma followed by a masters degree in Organisation development based on Gestalt psychology which informs and underpins most of her recent works. Her eclectic work experience and exposure to a wide variety of studies and professional practices provided/-ing her with a fertile ground for her art.

She is using subversion of imagery to shift meanings, create different narratives, new visual languages and to look at familiar scenes from different angles. She tends to approach her work through a humanist lens examining the human experience, our vulnerabilities, idiosyncrasies and our quest for self-discovery. Her aim is not to shock but to inspire, enlighten and challenge dominant narratives. Agnes is working with traditional and experimental processes, investigating the essential concepts and boundaries of collage and photography and their potential to create space for connection and reflection.

Her work has been exhibited and published internationally and can be found in private collections.
